


The federal government has invested trillions of taxpayer dollars into an education system that is <u>not driving</u>






First-year student enrollment spiked 5.5% in fall 2024

The final data from the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center comes a week after the group retracted preliminary findings showing a decline.

- All sectors enjoyed enrollment increases.
- For-profit, four-year institutions had the largest enrollment growth, with headcounts rising **7.5%** in fall 2024 compared to the year before.
- Public two-year institutions and public primarily associate-degree granting baccalaureate institutions, saw similar levels of growth — 5.8% and 6.3%, respectively.



Factors influencing Gen Z's interest in vocational education

Cost

Vocational schools are more affordable than traditional fouryear colleges.

Job market

There is demand for skilled trades workers in fields like plumbing, HVAC, and welding.

Technology

Gen Zers see manual labor as less vulnerable to automation than white-collar jobs.


The Importance of Due Process & When to Take Decisive Action

 - Due Process




